Survivors and their children will receive the support they need, when they need it. Our services reflect and understand the needs of our diverse communities, and respond in ways that are person-centred, trauma-informed, and needs-led. We will ensure that nobody in Sussex is left behind.

Strategic Objectives and Priority Actions

Objective 1: Early Intervention

- Increase awareness of domestic abuse and support available
- Education and awareness raising with professionals
- Delivery of specialist training
- Preventing escalation of abusive behaviours
- Promotion and increase of 'Clare's law' applications and disclosures

Objective 2: Support for Everyone

- Reducing barriers to accessing support
- Reducing risk
- Supporting children and young people
- Experience of justice
- Housing
- Strengthening services

Objective 3: Recovery

- Recognise and provide services that address the impact on mental health
- Promote connections for survivors to support them to process trauma
- Strengthening and Supporting Families
- Supporting survivors to achieve economic independence
- Valuing the voices of lived experience

To foster a coordinated multi-agency approach

We will strive to strengthen, and continue developing a coordinated multi agency approach, through the Pan Sussex Domestic Abuse Partnership Board, and local delivery boards. We will:

- Hold regular Pan Sussex Domestic Abuse Partners representatives from all relevant agencies.
- Establish a centralised database for sharing information and tracking cases.

Our Governance

The Pan Sussex Domestic Abuse Partnership Board and the associated governance structure supporting the function of the board, brings together subject matter experts and stakeholders, who work in partnership to strengthen responses across Sussex. The Voices of Lived experience board works in close partnership with the Domestic Abuse Partnership Board Manager, ensuring that survivor voice and experiences are central to the work.

Our success will be measured through:

• Reduction in the number of repeat domestic abuse incidents reported.









- Increase in early intervention measures being delivered
- Increase in the number of Survivors accessing support services.
- Improved satisfaction rates among service users.
- Increased awareness and understanding of domestic abuse within the community.
- The behaviour of perpetrators being addressed through criminal justice and rehabilitation measures.
